
AAUW-KC held a tabling event promoting the 3-State Strategy: ERA, the Equal Pay Day Rally to be April 8, 2014, and a membership drive.

History Corner By Ardy Pearson / Dana Perry Bridge Club had been an integral part of AAUW for as long as the present members can recall.

Born in 1919, Frances Weeks joined AAUW right out of college, inspired by the example of her Aunt, Eva Marie Harrod (Mrs. Robert Metzger), who was a member. Frances remembers playing bridge on Friday afternoons at the Sophian Plaza, where AAUW rented space for 47 years. The Sophian building was converted to condominiums in 1979 and AAUW had to find a new location. Until then, on Friday afternoons AAUW women would show up at the Sophian to play their weekly bridge game, often keeping two or three tables busy. The hired "colored woman" Rosie cooked lunch for the ladies. After the Sophian was no longer available,

the bridge club temporarily dissolved, but soon began meeting in various members' homes or at the Rockhill Tennis Club. Audrey Shafer, Bridge Club player, was a member of the tennis club, so they could use the club house. They would arrive at 10:30 in the morning, play a few hands, break for lunch, and then play until 3 p.m. The AAUW Bridge Club played their last hand in the winter of 2012-13. (Audrey Shafer had recently died and they were down to just four members.) The club had been meeting at Kathy Dunn's retirement home, but first Margaret McGregor and then Florence Petrides had to go into a retirement homes, leaving Frances Weeks

the sole active member.

The thing that Frances liked best about the AAUW bridge club was the "friendships". Frances still plays bridge with her church bridge group. "Who knows, the club might one day return to life." Please call Frances at (913) 649-7048 if you are interested in playing and restarting the Bridge Club.
