The 2013 Award was presented to **Samuel Arbesman** for his book *The Half-Life of Facts*. The finalists were: **Hughes Keenan**, *The Harvest Is Past* and **Debra McArthur**, *A Voice for Kansas*. Congratulations to all 17 nominated local authors!

"35 Authors: Where Are They Now?", a special tribute to the past winners, was presented by guest speaker Vivien Jennings, president of Rainy Day Books. The tribute was a compilation of author interviews, research and a video produced by event and reading committee members.



Carrie Maidment and the Event Committee deserve our highest praise and deepest appreciation for their devoted and meticulous work of planning and presenting this event. The readers deserve no less: Pam Chaudoin and the Reading Committee are also to be thanked for helping to make the AAUW Thorpe Menn Award for Literacy Excellence so significant.

Moving on to the great plans for the future: Programs for the rest of the year are shaping up to be informative, thought-provoking and inspiring. I hope you will all watch the calendar for not-to-be-missed dates ahead.

Perhaps a little less exciting, but nevertheless important to the future and ongoing well-being of AAUW-KC, a Bylaws Committee has been formed to review the Branch Bylaws with the eye toward possible revisions, with member approval, next spring. The review was prompted by the History Update Committee member and Branch Archivist Corinne Mahaffey, who in turn was prompted by the suggestion from the Curator at the Western Missouri Historical Manuscript Collection, where Branch archives are kept. It was recommended that the official establishment of that center as the repository for Branch Archives be put into the Branch bylaws, ensuring that the existence and whereabouts of the Branch historical documents be passed on to future members. In addition, a few mandatory clarifying changes to the bylaws have come to us from the national office, and although they don't need member approval, it's fitting that all these amendments take place at once – for efficiency sake, if nothing else. In light of these developments, the Board agreed to review the bylaws to determine if there are any other areas that may need modification or clarification. If any member is so inclined, please take a look at the bylaws and offer suggestions. I'll be happy to take them to the Committee for discussion or you can volunteer to join the Committee in its discussions. Committee volunteers are Renee Carlson, Winnie Weinrich, and Corinne Mahaffey.

History Corner

Club members polished up on their German vocabulary, grammar and culture

The German Club was already in existence when Ruth Engel joined Kansas City AAUW in 1970, moving to KC from her Branch in Maryland. At the time Rita Herbert was the teacher; after Rita moved to California to be near her son, Renata Meyer taught the group. Ruth Engel remained a constant member of the club until it ceased to exist on July 3, 2001, when Renata moved to a retirement home. Even after moving into the home, Renata would present German language work sheets to her friends when they came to visit.

Ruth remembers the German Club being a “no nonsense” group of generally six to eight women, sometimes a few more, sometimes less. Some members who participated off and on were Marjorie Bernard, Ardy Pearson,

Katherine McNeerney, Nan Schott, Fern Halliburton, Loraine Tipton, Vera Baker, and Marxie Hesler. The group met on the first and third Tuesdays of the month, working at translating and polishing their German vocabulary and grammar. They also read and discussed German poets, including Johann Wolfgang von Goethe, Heinrich Heine, Friedrich von Schiller, and Gunter Grass. Ruth is a particular fan of Heine.

The German Club met at various locations throughout the years. For the forty-seven years that AAUW rented space at the elegant Sophian Plaza, they met in the club room there. In 1979, when the Sophian building was converted to condominiums, the German Club had to find a new location. They met at the Twin Oaks Apartment Building, the

UMKC Women’s Center, or at various members’ homes.

Ruth admits she never really mastered the German language, even though she had studied it in college, too. Her brother John had studied German and she wanted to follow his lead. Ruth joined the AAUW German Club because they “had a good time being challenged.” Sometimes the members would go out to lunch together after their lessons (not necessarily to a German restaurant).



ERA FACTS By Joanie Shores

The complete text of The Equal Rights Amendment:

- Section 1. Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.
- Section 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.
- Section 3. The amendment shall take effect two years after the date of ratification.
