opportunities that give women a chance for a lifetime of success.

- Eleanor Roosevelt Fund (#9170) supports AAUW research to provide analysis, data, and accurate information about issues that are important to women and girls.

From Oscar- and Emmy-nominated filmmaker Kirby Dick comes *The Invisible War*, a groundbreaking investigative documentary about one of America's most shameful and best-kept secrets — the epidemic of rape within the U.S. military. The film

premiered at the 2012 Sundance Film Festival, where it received the U.S. Documentary Audience Award and it was nominated for Best Documentary Feature at the 85th Academy Awards.

What is the most shameful and best-kept secret in the U.S. military? The epidemic of rape and sexual assault within the ranks. An American female soldier in a combat zone is more likely to be raped by a fellow soldier than killed by enemy fire. A culture of privilege and impunity has resulted in few prosecutions, and the systematic isolation of women — and men — who dare report these crimes.

On January 16, AAUW-KC, in cooperation with the National Archives at Kansas City, will present *The Invisible War.* Join us at 5:30 p.m. for a brief reception followed by the 6:00 p.m. showing and a panel discussion with AAUW and community leaders. The National Archives at Kansas City is located at 400 West Pershing Road, next to Union Station.

Remembering a generous woman, friend and leader

Nettie Irene Van Der Veer Wagy was the branch program vice president in the 1970s, and loved her friends at AAUW. She kept up with the news and was happy to share her opinions! Her greatest love was the Garden Group. She was also one of the early leaders of the Cuisine Club when it started.

Trained as a dietitian, she married late and her husband died early, so she was single or a widow for many years of her life. They had bought a Prairie Village bungalow after World War II, and when he died, they did not have much equity in it, but she took the insurance money and parlayed it into a nice living. She watched



for foreclosures in her neighborhood, went to Capitol Federal and talked them into loaning her money to fix them up and rent them. The neighbors reported that she was very good to the young people to whom she rented. She encouraged them to go back to school, to get a better job, or to buy the house they were renting.

Her other great interest was DAR (Daughters of the American Revolution), a non-profit women's organization for the descendants of individuals who aided in achieving American independence. She belonged to two chapters and helped with research for them. She left one half of her estate to AAUW (approximately \$200,000), and the other half to the two DAR chapters. You can see that the associations she had with her women friends were very important to her.

We are proud to report that \$10,000 will be awarded in four grants in her name on December 7, 2013. Irene would be pleased!

ERA FACTS By Joanie Shores

Which 15 states have not ratified the ERA?

Answer: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Nevada, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Utah and Virginia.

Have you visited your state representative And yes, my legislator said YES! about ratification? I did, and I can tell you it was FUN! And NOW is the best time, while they're between sessions and in-district.

You will need to make an appointment first, and it may take several phone calls/emails. Be sure to tell them that you're a voting constituent and provide your District #.

Before you meet, visit their website to research their voting record, introduced or co-sponsored bills, etc. Look for a focal point to gain their support.

My representative and I met at a coffeeshop and I treated us to breakfast. I was genuinely friendly, as was she. (Stay warm, keep smiling, don't ever get shrill or defensive!) After some small talk, I made my pitch. Remember, you must make the 'ASK'-Would you co-sponsor HCR# 36 for Missouri ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment?

Next day send them a thank you card/email. Then start planning for a visit with your state senator

In summary:

- Make an appointment. Be persistent.
- Get to know your legislator. Visit their website for research.
- Be friendly and SMILE!
- Tell a personal story relating to ERA.
- Stick to the ERA issue ONLY.
- Make the 'ASK'.
- Follow up with a thank you.
